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Starting Over

With his legal work on the Fitzgerald Estate largely concluded, Manahan and his family returned to Minnesota. They bought a house at 876 Laurel Avenue in St. Paul on December 28, 1904, and for the next 83 years, until Kathryn's death in 1987, that was the family homestead.

He was a lawyer with few professional accomplishments. His political ambitions had waned. He had no desire to ascend to the bench, nor was making money a high priority. With the Fitzgerald family connections, he might have landed a position with a railroad. Instead he chose to open his own shop in St. Paul. In 1905, at the age of 39, he was starting over.
